Post Summary

The School of Linguistic, Speech and Communications Sciences seeks to appoint a part-time Assistant Professor in Speech and Language Pathology. The successful candidate will have a PhD, or be in the process of completing a doctoral degree and will carry out teaching and research on aspects of disorders of communication and/or swallowing.

Background to the Post

This post is central to the undergraduate educational activities within the Department. In particular, the appointee will be expected to collaborate with colleagues in developing and delivering an integrated, enquiry-based learning curriculum leading to a qualification in Speech and Language Therapy and to support the Department in meeting the requirements of accreditation by CORU (the Irish state regulator for health and social care professionals) and the Irish Association of Speech and Language Therapists. In addition, the post-holder may contribute to postgraduate activities through teaching, research supervision or clinical practice support for students registered for postgraduate qualifications within the department.

Standard Duties of the Post

The successful candidate will be expected to:

Contribute to Teaching

- The Assistant Professor will have a track record of teaching, clinical practice and research in human communication disorders and/or swallowing.
- S/he will have a professional qualification in Speech and Language Therapy and will be eligible for registration with CORU as a Speech and Language Therapist.
- S/he will be expected to lead and teach some curriculum modules within the Department of Clinical Speech and Language Studies at undergraduate level with some postgraduate teaching, in line with current workload models within the School.
- The appointee will be expected to provide research supervision to undergraduate students.
 It is anticipated that the post holder will also undertake some postgraduate project supervision, either as a sole supervisor or with a co-supervisor.
- The successful candidate will also be expected to offer clinical teaching to undergraduate and some postgraduate students, including involvement in assessment of clinical competence of undergraduate students.

- Have evidence of a minimum of 3 years' post qualification experience of working as a speech and language therapist.
- Have or be willing to acquire an appropriate postgraduate professional qualification in thirdlevel teaching (e.g. by taking the new Trinity College Postgraduate programme in Teaching and Learning in Higher Education for which fees will be paid).

The School of Linguistics, Speech and Communication Sciences has a strong identity nationally and internationally for excellence in research and teaching. It includes the Department of Clinical Speech and Language Studies (https://www.tcd.ie/slscs/), and the Centre for Language and Communication Studies (https://www.tcd.ie/slscs/clcs/) incorporating the Centre for Deaf Studies (https://www.tcd.ie/slscs/cds/).

The successful applicant will join a dynamic, research-focused academic team within the department of Clinical Speech and Language Studies. The department offers a four-year honors BSc degree programme, leading to a professional qualification in speech and language therapy (https://www.tcd.ie/slscs/undergraduate/). There are 34 student places per year in the undergraduate programme. The department also offers a range of postgraduate taught programmes (https://www.tcd.ie/slscs/postgraduate/taught-courses/clinical-speech-language/), with approximately 15-20 students registered with these programmes, as well as approximately ten students registered for research MSc and PhD degrees.

The School currently has 26 academic staff, of whom six are based in the department of Clinical Speech and Language Studies. In addition, a Practice Education Coordinator oversees and manages the undergraduate clinical education programme. The work of the Department is supported by a Senior Executive Officer and a Receptionist. The department offers an on-site clinical service, where staff undertake some clinical work and support students in supervised clinical practice.

The Department has strong links with similar programmes within Ireland and across the UK, as well as research and teaching links with many other universities in Europe and North America.

GARDA CLEARANCE:
